Letterboxing 101

According to legend, letterboxing began in southwestern England in 1854 when a Victorian gentleman, James Perrott, hid his calling card in a jar in a remote area by Cramere Pool in the moors of Dartmoor. Perrot was a guide on the moor and encouraged his clients to leave their card in a jar as well.

Eventually visitors began leav-

ing self-addressed post cards or notes in the jar hoping for them to be returned via mail by the next visitor. The origin of the term "letterboxing;" letterbox being the British term for what we know as a mailbox. This practice ended in time, and the current custom of using rubber

stamps and visitor logbooks came into use. Today, there are more than 3,000 letterboxes in the 365 square miles of Dartmoor National Park.

The hobby came to the US in 1998 following the publication of an article in the Smithsonian magazine about Dartmoor. Letterboxing North America is host to a website and discussion list where new clues are posted to sites where these Letterboxes are located.

Letterboxing is intended to be an environmentally friendly activity with no destruction of nature involved in the hiding or discovery of letterboxes. Boxes are hidden in publicallyaccessible areas, yet out of sight of casual visitors, and come in a varied amount of sizes depending on the stamp, log

> book, and possibility of having a 'hitchhiking' visitor stamp.

Letterboxing—A Pan Pagan Festival Contest

Every year the Pan Pagan Festival has a special contest for the attendees. It started out as "find the hidden word in the program book". This was the Council's way of getting attendees to read the program book; when asked what attendees thought of a workshop the response was "I wish I knew about that workshop, I would have liked to attend." For the past few years, it has turned into a "treasure" hunt to find objects around the campground or in our main festival area.

This year, we are doing the contest a little differently. The contest is to find Letterboxes.

Letterboxing is a growing hobby that combines elements of hiking (well not so much at Pan), treasure hunting and creative expression into an activity that attendees of all ages can enjoy. Participants seek out hidden letter boxes by following clues—the first clue will be hidden in the program book and each letter box thereafter will contain a clue to the following box.

Each letterbox will contain a stamp and stamp pad, which attendees will use to stamp Letterboxing page of their program book. The last box is special, as it will contain a log book that you, the attendee, will stamp with your own personal stamp, to mark that you found all the boxes.

There will be a workshop on how to make your own personal stamp if

you didn't bring one with you. (If you don't want to make a stamp, or didn't bring one with you, =(see Dori and she might be able to help you out.)

As with all our contests, once you have found all the letter boxes, bring your completed sheet, with your name on it, to Registration and turn it in. The contest ends at 4pm Saturday. Winners will be drawn from the completed sheets. Winners will receive \$10 Merchant Dollars to spend on Merchant Row.

The Characters of Numerology by Lady Anna

There are many different designs of Numerology charts. Like any magical writings, you can make it as complex or as simple as you want. I will keep it simple for learning purposes.

Each numerology chart has three pillars. These pillars describe you, your path and your future. I have also seen different names for each section. I will attempt to give you samples of variations for each section.

The following list is the basic sections of a numerology chart:

<u>Destiny-</u> or Life Path is the number represents the particular types of influences you must successfully encounter to achieve maximum fulfillment in your total lifetime.

<u>Birth Path</u> - This represents the understanding of who you are and where your talents lie. This is the gift you are born with.

<u>Life Cycle-</u> Three cycles that reveal the kinds of influences, opportunities and people that will be

most important in that cycle.

CYCLE #1 - The Formative Cycle is learning and mental development.

CYCLE #2 – The Productive Cycle is using the education with work and productive activity.

CYCLE #3 – The Harvest Cycle is what it implies; a time to reap what you have sewn, usually retirement.

<u>Attainment-</u> or Pinnacles are in effect for nine years each, with the exception of the first Attainment.

<u>Challenges-</u> This number indicates potential obstacles which must be overcome.

<u>Personal Year-</u> The nine year cycle that holds opportunities fir new beginnings, development, and completion in each cycle.

<u>Soul Urge</u>- or Motivation represents what you consciously want out of life.

Quiet Self- or Impression represents the pure fantasy side of you.

<u>Expression-</u> This indicates the manner in which you best express yourself.

<u>Lack of Karma-</u> This indicates experiences which you have not met in past lives and therefore are lessons you must learn in this one.

<u>Abundance of Karma-</u> This indicates experiences which have occurred frequently in past lives.

<u>Sub-Conscious Response-</u> This is the way you instinctively react in times of crisis.

<u>Corner Stone-</u> The foundation upon which your life is built.

<u>Balance Number-</u> This is the number you fall back on in emergencies and seek to stand firm.

<u>**Key-**</u> This indicates how your life will be lived.

<u>Spiritual Balance-</u> What your inner self is being exposed to in this life as a form of a lesson in life.

Recipe Hour with Dori

One of the things I remember when I first started in the craft was making Sabbat Cakes. For the recipe, everyone went to Lady Sheba's book. Since that was more than 30 years ago and my High Priestess, like my mother, never followed the receipt exactly, this is close to what we used with a few changes which are in italics.

1 cup shortening or ½ cup shortening and ½ cup butter
1/3 cup sugar (or 1 ½ tbs honey)
2/3 cup ground blanched almonds
(or 1 tsp almond extract and 1 tsp

white wine)

1 2/3 cup flour (or 1 1/3 c flour and 1/3 c oats)

¼ tsp salt

1 cup confectioner's sugar

1 tsp cinnamon

Changes: there was never time to dip the cakes in sugar and cinnamon, (besides the confectioner's sugar gets all over everything) the cinnamon was put in the batter. And since this can be really dry, 1 egg was added. Mix together shortening, sugar and almonds, Sift together flour and salt. Stir into almond mixture until soft dough forms. Chill dough for at least 1 hour. Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Break off pieces of chilled dough and roll pencil thin. Cut rolled dough in 2 ½ inch lengths and form into crescent shape. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet until set, but not brown, about 14-16 minutes. Mix together confectioner's sugar and cinnamon. Cool cookies on pan and while slightly warm carefully dip each in cinnamon mixture. Approximately five dozen crescent moons.
